

I received this note the other day from one John King, whom I spent time with in the R.A.F. Police at R.A.F. Negombo, Ceylon.

The other day jogged my dormant grey cells of my first Ceylon licence. (1957) Having just got married Peg and I decided it would be good idea to buy a car instead of cycling everywhere. I purchased an old Lanchester, it was a large car with a pre-selector gear box. The problem was I only had an R.A.F. driving licence but having made friends with a local Singhalese family with three brothers one of them being a local government officer in Negombo I asked if he could arrange for me to get a Ceylon licence. A couple of days later I met him at his office in Negombo and after a cup of tea, told me go outside and read one of a car registration plate, which I did. He then made out the licence, which I believe had a red cover, and said that I was now able to drive on the countries roads. I was surprised that he never attempted to see how well 1 was able to drive, but I suppose that because I drove R.A.F. Police vehicles that it was alright. When I opened the licence there on the first page was my particulars, on the first line was written John and underneath was King of Negombo. I always wondered what the reactions of the local constabulary would have been if they had stopped me and asked for my licence. Sadly over the years the licence has been mislaid.

R.A.F. WEST KIRBY

Ken Needham

A few weeks ago a couple of us ex R.A.F. Chaps talked, over a very nice lunch, about their time at R.A.F. West Kirby. In the 1950's this was one of the Basic training stations for raw recruits, both National Service and regular servicemen.

Although four years apart on our time on the camp, Charles Temple and I, both had the same memories. "A shock to the system"



We both remember that first morning which I think is best reported from an article I found on the world wide web. "I fell asleep as soon as my head hit the pillow, and it seemed no time at all before the door opened with a crash and a Corporal stamped in yelling 'OK LADS! HANDS OFF YOUR COCKS AND SOCKS ON. GET UP YOU IDLE AIRMEN. **GET UP**. YOU'RE NOT AT HOME NOW AND I'M NOT YOUR MOTHER." Words that I am sure rang out in the ears of all airmen who joined the force in the 1950's.

Charles had the pleasure of being on camp in 1952, and told me that he did an extra 2 weeks due to the Coronation. I'll bet that went down well.

In the four years between our visits, the camp had progressed. During Charles' time they just had hut letters, against when I arrived there was four squadrons. Charles was 'B' Flight whilst I was in Smutts Squadron. We had a yellow disc behind the beret badge. No recognition for Charles, as I don't think there was so many of them.

"Despite all this racket," the web site story goes on, "one or two failed to stir sufficiently so he lifted the end of their beds about eighteen inches and allowed



them to drop, shouting 'IF YOU DON'T WANT MY BOOT UP YOUR ARSE, GET OUT **NOW**." All this was a different type of morning activity for both of us, and I for one was beginning to wish I had never signed on. Charles was National Service so he had no choice, but I was a regular, so I had only myself to blame. One thing I forgot to mention all this took place at around 06.00 hrs, a time we didn't know existed.

We both remembered with fondness the pot bellied stoves in the billet, but as Charles was on camp during the summer they weren't used, but whilst I was on camp, we used to get them glowing red. Also useful for melting boot polish for boot cleaning.

With the reminiscing that Charles and I had over lunch, brought to mind a story of whilst I was helping on a stall on Hitchin market with R.A.F. Henlow. A gentleman came to the stall and said that he was a DI at Kirby in the 1950's. I mentioned that I was a recruit there at that time, and we started to reminisce. Standing along side was a serving airman, who said after listening to us old airman's stories said, "I have heard those stories before, but until now have always thought them to be old wives tales of ex airman trying to say that it was harder in the old days". Both together the DI and I said "Believe it Boy believe it".

May I thank Charles for a very pleasant lunch and some good conversation.
