Hundreds of R.A.F. Police have moved from R.A.F. Henlow into their new headquarters at a former air base at Honington in Suffolk.

The service's police took over their new base at R.A.F. Honnington a few weeks ago, but most of them are deployed across the world, protecting R.A.F. Bases and aircraft from threats such as espionage, organised crime and terrorism. They also investigate crime, drug offences and advise on legal issues.

They also, as members who attended our May meeting know, have a very active dog section. Today's police dog is not only trained for security, but also in searching for drugs, explosives and weapons.

# GENERAL EOUIPMENT AND MANPOWER

A400M Support Contract. The first support contract for A400M Atlas has been announced. The £175 million contract was awarded to Airbus Defence and Space (ADS). The news comes as Rolls-Royce has announced an £18 million investment in Bristol to support the TP400 engine. The money will fund facilities for maintenance, repair and overhaul of the engines, training for employees, and conversion of an existing test bed to be capable of running the engine while on the ground.

**Typhoon and Paveway IV.** The RAF will release up to 20 Paveway IV weapons this month when they deploy to the USA for exercises. This comes after successful release of live Paveway IV bombs over the Cape Wrath training area as part of the latest Typhoon upgrade P1Eb. The predominantly air-to-ground capability upgrade provides enhancements to the Litening III Laser Designator Pod and a helmet-mounted sight. The pod can now be used seamlessly with the sight to visually identify air tracks at long range, as well as identifying, tracking and targeting points on the ground.

**Brimstone 2.** The first 20 production standard Brimstone 2 missiles have been delivered. Brimstone 2 will bring a range of operational performance and logistical benefits that will provide advantages in operational use and stockpile management. These come from the missile being classified as an insensitive munition due to the new warhead and rocket motor design as well as improvements in the seeker, guidance and greater air carry hours.

The Branch speaker for April was Ann Wise, who spoke about World War One, but not the battle fields as most media are reporting at the moment, but what it was like on the Home Front. How the war was effecting those left behind. We all know what it was like during the second world war (some of us even part of it), but we know very little of the home front of the first war.



Ann explained how rationing came into to being, a thing that had not been heard of before. How the women had to turn their hands to doing a man's job. On the farming front, and many other tasks, women turned to wearing trousers to under take their manly tasks, a thing that was frowned upon, and even legislation was passed to ensure that the ladies did not demure themselves whilst wearing these male garments.

Yes, it all happened again 24 years later, but during the 1914 - 1918 war, it was all new to those left behind on the 'Home Front'.






We had R.A.F. Air Dog Buster come along to our May Branch meeting to have a chat with us. His handler Flt Sgt Will Burrow came along as well, but as Will admitted, it was Buster that was the star attraction. Buster was not shy to go around the room meeting all members, before Will started the evening by telling members of his career in the Royal Air Force.

He had joined the R.A.F at 18, specialising as a Drug Detection Dog Handler and an Arms and Explosive Search Dog Handler, serving in the

Falklands, Northern Ireland, Bosnia, Afghanistan and Iraq. In fairness it was Buster's story we all wanted to hear.

Buster is an English springer spaniel. He has earned many military tributes and has served in three separate wars in Bosnia, Iraq and Afghanistan, an achievement unparalleled by any



other service dog. He won the Crufts Friends for Life Award in 2012 and also nominated for a prestigious Sun Military Award in 2009. Buster is the official lifetime mascot of the Royal Air Force Police. He retired a military hero in 2011.

Buster, (with a little help of Will Burrow) has written a book entitled "Buster, the dog who saved a thousand lives".

Ann Wise returned to our June Branch meeting to talk to us about how to date old family photographs. Ann told those present that one of the main ways to date old photographs was by the type of dress being warn by the subject.

She also explained about the history of portrait photography, and how the subjects would still for up to 20 minutes for the correct exposure. This meant that many



subjects were propped with unseen pillars or props. Very few early subjects smiled as this could not be maintained for such a long time. In the early days cameras were not very portable so the subjects attended studios, unless of course you were very rich.

In the studio the photographer was able to use props to ease the burden of the wait such as a balustrade to lean on or the back of a chair.

The photographer liked to advertise so some photographs have the name of

the photographer printed or embossed on the photograph, some even put the date, which makes life easier for dating.

As the cameras improved so did the taking of the portrait photograph. Speed time became faster, so more children appeared as subjects, and them pets. Now we can take picture in a fraction of a second.

The above donations are from different members and we most grateful to the three of them for their kind generosity. Their donations help to keep the Branch running and improve.



As many of you know, each year, our Vice Chairman, Roy Newbury, goes off to France each year to represent the Aircrew Association and our Association in remembering those members of Bomber Command who lost their lives over the Mailly area. I have asked Roy to tell us who the men are that he goes over to remember.

This year's event took place on the 5<sup>th</sup> May 2015 at the French Military Camp to commemorate the Bomber Command strike at this target some 4 weeks before D

Day 6<sup>th</sup> Jun 1940. Mailly was the base for all French mechanized forces from early 1900's with vast workshops etc. Resistance intelligence had informed their UK receptors that The Hohensteufen Panzer Division being refitted was on the point of departure.

With bright moonlight and clear skies the orbiting Lancaster circled there Holding point flare's pattern for some 18 minutes awaiting the command to strike. Due to a breakdown in radio communication this was not audible until back-up raid

Commanders took over as both No 1 and No 5 Group bombers were now in circuit with inevitable collisions.

Meanwhile the nearby Luftwaffe night fighter stations at Laon, Rheims and St Dizier had dispatched there deadly shragermuzic equipped fighters, which resulted in a loss of 42 Lancaster, one Mosquito and one Halifax on counter radio interference on the fighter 's radio wavelength

Damage to the camp was indeed considered a success with an indeterminate number of German casualties. Unfortunately slave labour corps stationed on site also suffered casualties.

Unfortunately the panzer division entrained was some 1.5 kilometes from the camp area and escaped the attention of the orbiting Lancasters. Although the RAF had suffered heavier losses than those incurred at Mailly, its casualties were in a more confine radius some 80 miles due east of Paris.

A Mailly Commemoration society was started when a retired army officer went looking for his brother's grave in the village of Voue. Seen by the local mayor, subsequent correspondence developed into the ¾ Mai Mailly Association with a local history group compiled a dossier of all the RAF participants and subsequent casualties, locations of crash site and CWGC plots in local churchyards. The RAF memorial is now located in the centre of Mailly Camp. Over the past years raid veterans and next of kin have paid homage by travelling out to Mailly hosted by the Mailly Garrison. RAF personnel (ex 101 Sqn.) from Brize Norton also attend. ATC cadets and band from the Humber region have also attended. Apart from the main ceremony the yearly visits extends to a selection of the many crash sites especially if next of kin are attending.
