The Branch are delighted and hugely honoured to announce the appointment of Viscount Lord Hugh Trenchard as our Branch Honorary President.

Lord Trenchard served in the British Army from 1972 – 1980 as a Captain in the 4th Battn, the Royal Green Jackets. In 2006, he became Honorary Air Commodore of 600 (City of London) Squadron RAuxAF. Furthermore, Lord Trenchard served as a member of council and trustee for our sister charity the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund from 1991-2003 and again from 2006 – 2013.

Lord Trenchard has been a loyal supporter of the Branch for many years, most recently joining with the Branch in our B of B Church Service; RAF 100th anniversary celebrations back in 2018; and William Road Memorial 100 year anniversary in 2012.

Of course, being the grandson of the 'Father of the Royal Air Force' Marshall of the Royal Air Force Hugh Montague Trenchard GCB, OM, GCVO, DSO – the honoured bestowed on our Royal Air Forces Association Branch is of the highest order – we look forward to many years of your Honorary Presidency.

I first knew Roy when he joined the branch in 2008. At that time we had just lost our Standard Bearer, and Roy volunteered for the post. After his first funeral, it wasn't long before he had written a procedure on funeral duties, as he thought that such an important duty must be perfect. Whenever a vacancy in a branch position came up, Roy didn't allow it to stay vacant for long, as he would stand in with his usual enthusiasm. He was finally appointed Vice Chairman, a position he held until age caught up with him, and he didn't think he could do the position justice.

Roy was one of the main contributors to the 100 year ceremony of the Willian Memorial. Whilst I did the admin side, he arranged for the pilot's families to attend, and with the help of our then RAFALO invite the RAF 3 Sqd Colour Party from RAF Coningsby.

I remember on a branch visit to RAF Honington and the RAF Regiment museum, Roy was inspecting one of the exhibit of the Middle East, just after World War II, and spotted an error, which he pointed out to a member of the staff. It was quickly corrected. Why was Roy so sure about the fact, well he was there at the time. Roy had many stories of the Middle East just after the war.

Roy we will miss you.

I was looking in the archives of a similar magazine I once compiled for a group of RAF Police personnel, when I came across a selection of Christmas Day menus from stations across the world during the middle of 1900's.

In this country it was just after second World War, and food rationing was still in force. I remember that it wasn't turkey on the Christmas Day table, it might be a chicken, if you were lucky. I have reproduced on following pages, a few of the menus I have collected, and just take a look at the meal the RAF personnel were eating, and most of these menus are from the Airmen's mess. Remember all this would be table service, with the Officers acting as waitresses.

I suggest you take a look at the one from 107 MU Middle East. This one includes and evening buffet, which includes SPAM. The thing to remember is the year — 1944. The War was still being fought.

Do we have any Chefs amongst us who can remember what they served up at Christmas time?

My friend Pat did his National Service as a Military Policeman. Recently another friend, an ex Army Officer told him he was entitled to receive the recently issued General Service Medal for his service in the Canal Zone.

Pat did not want to bother, but the friend persuaded him. So he wrote to the appropriate department. Several weeks later he received a letter from the medals awards department. "Before we consider your application for the award of the North Atlantic Medal, will you please supply documentary evidence for the time served north of the Arctic Circle and west of the Urals during the years 1939 to 1944".

Pat wrote back! I have never been north of the Arctic Circle; in fact I try not to go north of Watford. Furthermore during the years 1939 to 1944 I was still at school". He reiterated that his application had been for the GSM for the Canal Zone. e added a PS "Lloyd George knew my father".

He received a reply apologising for the error, the request had been forwarded to the wrong department, and the writer assured him that his request has been forwarded this time to the correct department.

STORMY WEATHER

Reflection of his military service by Ken Needham

Over the past few months we have seen the devastation caused by storms in the Americas and the Far East.

During my tour of duty in Ceylon I was once involved in helping in the relief to the population of that country after a hurricane hit the island.

In January 1958 a Minister had made a speech in the House of Commons. The following is taken from Hansards of that time.

"I wish tonight to call attention to the devastation and hardship caused by the appalling floods which occurred just before my arrival in Ceylon. In the third week of December, rains which have no parallel in recent records caused widespread and extensive damage throughout the island. The death roll exceeded 300, and at least 300,000 people, many of them the poorest peasants, suffered as a result of the floods through the destruction of their paddy lands, the loss of their homes, and the loss of all their livestock, The damage caused is now being investigated, but a provisional estimate suggests that it will cost in the neighbourhood of £40 million or £50 million to restore.

The floods were caused by continuous rains during the northeast monsoon. At one place I visited, I was told that there had been eleven inches of rain in twenty-four hours, a thing difficult for us in this country to appreciate. Such rains as these caused the breach of bunds of several of the larger irrigation reservoirs in the North, Central and Eastern provinces. These are the main rice producing areas of Ceylon, and

in many cases the floods completely wiped out all the harvest which was expected this year"

We were aware of the storm, and a small amount of damage had occurred on the Royal Air Force Katunayake camp, but we only realised the amount of devastation there was up country, when planes from countries all over the world landed bringing much needed relief supplies.

The call went out to all RAF personnel for volunteers to help on the supply drops to the cut off areas. I know there is a saying in the forces "Never volunteer", but I wanted to do my bit to help in this disaster. I was told to report to movements at 07.00 hrs the next day. There were quite a number of volunteers turned up. I and four others which included a Flight Sergeant were allocated to a Valetta aircraft.

There was very little room for us as the whole body of the aircraft was full of sacks. The aircraft door had been removed. The Flight Sergeant told us to fasten ourselves to the harnesses on the side of the fuselage.

We took off and flew at a fairly low level, and as we travelled further north we could see just what damage the storm had done. The water was still laying many feet deep in places.

En route a platform was pushed into the space where the door should have been. Finally the aircraft started to circle, and as we did the plane started to bank very steeply.

I was not good at heights, but usually I was fine in a plane. Wrong! My legs started to weaken. But I was a policeman, I could not let the side down in front of these airman. It got worse. The Flight Sergeant pointed to me and another volunteer and yelled over the noise "You two, one foot on the staging, you

others start handing them the bags when I say". The plane started to bank more, I was now looking almost straight down. "Now" came the command and I was handed the first sack. I took it, and threw it out.

By the time I had released the first sack, the second was ready. I quickly got into a routine, but was wishing that the next bag would be the last. To my amazement none of the sacks bust open on landing. To stop myself being sick I had to keep concentrating on what I was doing, but I could hear in the distance, above the noise such comments as "See if you can hit that chap with the green shirt" I just ignored them, anyway I couldn't have hit anything if I was trying, if they only knew how scared I was. Once all the sacks had gone, which seemed to take forever, the plane levelled and the platform was brought in, and we were back to normal, or as normal as it could be until we landed.

There was nobody more relieved than me when that plane came to a stop.

I didn't volunteer for any further relief work.

As we prepare, with all haste towards Christmas, I hope that all of us might be encouraged to spend some time in opening of lives to the wonder of God's love in the birth of His Son.



We are finding that in some cases the information we are given is out of date. The Head Office information is only as good as the information they receive from YOU.


If you have changed your address, telephone number, or e mail address over the past year, and not informed RAFA Head office, may we ask that you do so, in order that we can contact more of our members.
